Will you please convey to the mambers of the Board of Trustees and to the representatives of the Corporation my very best regards and cordial greatings. Will you furthernors please take some public opportunity of thanking them in my behalf for the verymany courtesies and ants of bospitality with which they have showered so during this lacture trip.

I am delighted that Empherg is to be elected as Director of the Jerusalem school in my place. From what I have seen of him and of his wife, I am elected that our School is fortunate in having him and her available.
